

Auckland governance framework:

- New local government structure from 1 Nov 2010
- The new structure is both simple/ complex
- Simple One organisation, one Mayor, one vision etc
- Complex Council equals the 21 local boards plus the governing body. Hence decision making can involve 22 meetings (or more).

















Strategy/ policy framework:

- New strategy/ policy structure is also simple/ complex
- Key overarching documents include:
 - The Mayor's Vision
 - The Auckland (Spatial) Plan (30 year vision)
 - The Unitary (district) plan land use focus
 - The Long Term Plan strategic funding and implementation (10 year focus)
 - Local Board Plans (21)
 - Consolidated Bylaws











Organisational Structure:

Opportunity

To create a single approach to the management of alcohol in Auckland that:

- Aligns to the strategic objectives of Auckland Council
- Represents and applies to the needs of Auckland's diverse communities
- Meets the requirements of new alcohol legislation



Purpose

To establish a region-wide approach to alcohol policy and planning in Auckland in order to foster safe, healthy and strong communities

Legislative Context

- Sale of Liquor Act (1989)
 - Current legislation to be repealed through the Alcohol Reform Bill and replaced with the Sale and Supply of Alcohol Act
- Local Government Act (2002)
 - Guides decision making and consultation processes
- Local Government (Auckland Council) Act (2009)
 - Guides role of local boards and Governing body throughout the programme development
- Local Government (Auckland Transitional Provisions) Act (2010)
 - Guides status of policies and bylaws inherited by Auckland Council
- Alcohol Reform Bill
 - Projects will be targeted to ensure Auckland Council is prepared for the impending enactment of the Alcohol Reform Bill.

Alcohol Framework


 High-level overarching policy document that will guide council's approach to alcohol-related policy development and initiatives

Alcohol Control (liquor ban) Policy and Bylaw

- Development of a region-wide policy and bylaw to enable the council to impose alcohol controls (liquor bans) in public places across Auckland
- Local Alcohol Policy (research phase)
 - Research and planning to prepare for the development of a local alcohol policy once the Alcohol Reform Bill is enacted. Focused on the research requirements set out in section 78 of the Bill

Purpose

The framework will be a high-level overarching policy document that will guide the council's approach to alcohol-related policy development and initiatives. It will provide the basis for a consistent Auckland approach to alcohol policy and planning.



Objective

The Framework will:

- identify overarching policy objectives to reduce alcohol related harm
- show the linkages between the councils alcohol related policies, processes and mechanisms.
- identify future activities that will streamline and improve current practices
- promote consistency and transparency in council decision making on alcohol related issues, and
- provide a foundation for partnerships and collaboration to reduce alcohol related harm and enhance community safety
