Dr. Evelyn Gillan

Dr Evelyn Gillan is the Chief Executive of Alcohol Focus Scotland (AFS), Scotland's national alcohol charity. Prior to joining AFS, Evelyn was the Director of SHAAP (Scottish Health Action on Alcohol Problems), an advocacy group established by the Scottish Medical Royal Colleges and Faculties. She is the co-author of three alcohol policy reports – Rethinking Alcohol Licensing (2011), Untold Damage (2009) and Alcohol, Price,

Policy and Public Health (2007). Before joining SHAAP, Evelyn was Head of Public Affairs at the Royal College of Nursing (Scotland), and prior to that, Co-Director of the Zero Tolerance Charitable Trust.



Caterina Giorgi

Caterina Giorgi (BSci Hons) is the Manager of Policy and Research at the Foundation for Alcohol Research and Education, a Canberra-based independent charitable organisation working to prevent the harmful use of alcohol in Australia. Caterina also tutors at the University of Canberra in advocacy, social justice and inclusion and is the consumer representative on the Australian Capital Territory Liquor Advisory Board. Caterina

has extensive experience working in government and not-for-profit policy, working in a range of social and health policy areas. Caterina has also worked in health behaviour research.

Prof. Sally Casswell

Sally Casswell is Professor of Social and Health Research and the Director of the SHORE and Whariki Research Centre, School of Public Health at Massey University, New Zealand. Her research interests are in social and public



health policy, particularly in relation to alcohol and other drugs. She has carried out research on the development and implementation of public policy at the national and community level and in the evaluation of these initiatives. A focus for some vears has been on commercial marketing of alcohol products. She is involved in international alcohol policy as a member of the WHO Expert Advisory Panel on Drug Dependence and Alcohol Problems and SHORE is a WHO Collaborating Centre. Professor Casswell also has an active involvement with the NGO sector including GAPA (Global Alcohol Policy Alliance) of which she is chair of the Scientific Advisory Board and APAPA (Asia Pacific Alcohol Policy Alliance). Professor Casswell is a Fellow of the Royal Society of New Zealand and an Officer of the Order of New Zealand.

Prof. Jennie Connor

Jennie Connor is Professor and Head of Department of Preventive and Social Medicine at the University of Otago in Dunedin. She is a public health physician and epidemiologist, involved in research about alcohol-related harm,
